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2. Second Reading (No Thru Trucks List) – Commissioner Gottwals

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE HOUSTON COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Houston County Public Works Department with the support of the Houston County Sheriff's Office to add Old Hawkinsville Road to the list of county roads designated in Article III, Section 62-56 as roads where through truck traffic is prohibited.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Houston County as follows:

That the Code of Ordinances, Houston County, Georgia, Section 62-56 is hereby amended by the addition of Old Hawkinsville Road, the section shall now read as follows:

Sec. 62-56. – Applicable Roads.

3. First Reading (Board of Adjustment and Appeals) – County Attorney Tom Hall

County Attorney Tom Hall will conduct the first reading of a repeal of Section 14-1 of Chapter 14, Article I of the Houston County Code of Ordinances titled Board of Adjustment and Appeals. This action is necessary because the Board adopted Article III – Building Inspection Department Administration; Division 4 – Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals; Sec. 14-111 titled Appointment, which redefined the establishment of the Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals, effectively replacing Sec. 14-1. This action will update the Houston County Code of Ordinances to reflect the current definition.

A second reading and public hearing will be held at the March 19, 2024 meeting, after which action may be taken.

AMENDMENT TO CODE OF ORDINANCES HOUSTON COUNTY, GEORGIA REPEAL SECTION 14-1

WHEREAS, it came to the attention of the Board of Commissioners of Houston County that Chapter 14; Article I; Sec. 14-1, titled Board of Adjustments and Appeals of the Code of Ordinances, Houston County, Georgia was replaced by Chapter 14; Article III; Division 4; Sec. 14-111 titled Appointments of the Code of Ordinances, Houston County, Georgia.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Houston County wants to repeal Section 14-1 in order to reflect the replacement of said section with Sec. 14-111.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Houston County as follows:

Sec. 14-1 titled Board of Adjustments and Appeals of Chapter 14 titled Buildings and Building Regulations; Article I titled In General, is hereby **REPEALED**.

The section to be repealed read as follows:

Sec. 14-1. - Board of adjustments and appeals.

There is hereby established a board of adjustments and appeals for the county. This board is to consist of one licensed architect, one engineer or general contractor and five other people involved in some capacity in the building business.

4. First Reading (Reserve Fund Policies) – County Attorney Tom Hall

County Attorney, Tom Hall will conduct the first reading of a proposed amendment to Section 2-274(f) of the Houston County Code of Ordinances regarding Capital Budget Policies. The proposed amendment will increase the unassigned general fund reserve accumulation for the County to strive for being at least equal to six months instead of three months of the total general fund budget.

A second reading and public hearing will be held at the March 19, 2024 meeting, after which action may be taken.

AMENDMENT TO CODE SECTION 2-274(f) CODE OF ORDINANCES HOUSTON COUNTY, GEORGIA

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Houston County as follows:

That the Code of Ordinances, Houston County, Georgia, Section 2-274(f) is hereby amended by increasing the unassigned general fund reserve accumulation for the County to strive for from at least equal to three months to at least equal to **six** months of the total general fund budget, the section shall now read as follows:

Sec. 2-274. – Reserve fund policies.

(f) The general fund may maintain all five classifications of fund balance. Houston County will strive to accumulate an unassigned general fund reserve at lease equal to six months of the total general fund budget.

SO APPROVED, this 19^{th} day of March 2024, by the Board of Commissioners of Houston County, Georgia.

DIAMOND IN THE ROUGH

An Economic Analysis of the Proposed Ocmulgee National Park and Preserve



iddle Georgia grassroots organizations have proposed the creation of an Ocmulgee National Park & Preserve that would consolidate the Ocmulgee National Monument with other public lands along the Ocmulgee River between Macon and Hawkinsville. To evaluate this proposal's potential economic effects, a study was commissioned by National Parks Conservation Association, funded in part by the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation.

Economists at the University of Tennessee Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics used the IMPLAN economic model to generate growth projections over a 15-year period comparing a hypothetical "National Park & Preserve" against a "No National Park & Preserve" scenario. Their findings indicate that, if created by Congress, an Ocmulgee National Park & Preserve could have significant impact on the regional economy. (See below.)

A National Park & Preserve could lead to a

six-fold increase in visitation within 15 years and add \$206.7 million in annual economic activity, defining a new trajectory for middle Georgia. The majority of this economic activity—about 90 percent—would come from increases in visitor spending associated with a number of key activities: heritage tourism, bicycling, paddling, camping, fishing, wildlife watching, hiking, hunting, and horseback riding. Business sectors most likely to expand or multiply within the local economy include restaurants, hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts, vacation rentals, campgrounds, sporting goods outfitters, retailers, and tours/outing services.

The Ocmulgee Heritage Trail and Ocmulgee River Water Trail have even greater potential than currently recognized to be integral to a National Park & Preserve and serve as primary drivers of recreation-based economic activity. Macon and middle Georgia also possess several additional, often-underappreciated features that could add up to a suite of unmatched educational, recreational, and


heritage tourism attractions coalescing around an Ocmulgee National Park & Preserve.

A growing body of research demonstrates that gateway communities near protected public lands, such as national parks, can cultivate competitive economic advantages over similar communities without such features. The key is to begin forging a long-term regional vision and to start systematically working toward it. Although creating a fully realized Ocmulgee National Park & Preserve could take a number of years, active and engaged communities can energize the process and hasten implementation. Nationwide, those gateway communities that actively promote, treasure, and cultivate their national parks and public lands reap the greatest benefits from them.

RE: Replacement of Culverts on Old Vienna Road

On February 12th, Houston County experienced heavy rainfall that exceeded 25-year rainfall intensities in areas. On Old Vienna Road, near the intersection of US 41, one of two culverts failed necessitating the closure of the road. Public Works solicited bids from contractors to replace both culverts (72" and 84" corrugated metal pipes to be replaced with reinforced concrete pipe) on Thursday February 8, 2024. The results are listed below.

10. Bank Services Recommendation – Commissioner Robinson

The Accounting Department, along with our consultant, Davenport & Company, reviewed options to meet our banking service requirements. After reviewing the proposals received, and interviewing a selection of financial institutions, staff and Davenport & Company believe the selected bank best meets our banking needs and recommend approval of their proposal.

11. Voting Delegate (Georgia Opioid Settlement) – Commissioner Robinson

The State of Georgia entered a Settlement Agreement with manufacturers and distributors of opioids that will bring payments of \$638 million to Georgia over 18 years. Department of Behavioral Health & Developmental Disabilities Commissioner Kevin Tanner is the Trustee of these funds. The State's share of the settlement funds is 75% (\$479 million) and will be put into a state-administered trust. Forty percent of the State's share of funds (\$191.6 million) must be spent on a regional basis. Commissioner Tanner asked the Association County Commissioners of Georgia (ACCG) to coordinate the role that Participating Local Governments will play with respect to the distribution of these regional funds.

The Memorandum of Understanding between the State of Georgia and Participating Local Governments requires the creation of the Georgia Opioid Settlement Advisory Commission (GOSAC) and Regional Advisory Councils (RACs), which will help to direct regional funding allocations. Three GOSAC members, representing local interests, and the RAC members for each region must be approved by the Participating Local Governments, which are defined as the litigating and non-litigating parties listed in the nationwide settlement agreements. This request is to select a voting delegate for Houston County

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the selection of Director of Administration, Robbie Dunbar, as a voting delegate for the Georgia Opioid Settlement Advisory Commission (GOSAC) and Regional Advisory Councils (RACs).
